We joke around, but All-Nighter has become a real thing on campus. We sell out every show, Princeton Alumni Weekly did a feature on us, and we won the Alberto Santos-Dumont Prize from the Office of the Dean of Undergraduate Students, recognizing the show as the best new student innovation of the year.

What you would do:

We're proud of what *All-Nighter* has grown into, and we want to make sure it continues, which is why we're looking for a new crop of writers who will see *All-Nighter* into the next generation and beyond. We all agree: writing for *All-Nighter* one of the most fun activities on campus. You get to chill with a small group of the funniest people around, see your work performed in front of a full, excited audience, and direct the path of a show that has become—and we hope continues to be—a campus institution. As a writer, these would be your official responsibilities:

- Attend the initial brainstorming session, the subsequent meeting (about a week later) where
 we read the material that we generated, the actor read-through a few days after that, the
 rehearsal on the day of the show, and the show itself
- Write material for each show (1-2 pieces per show, although every writer may not have a piece in every show)
- Contribute jokes for the monologue and sponsors
- Contribute ideas for guests, questions to ask them, and bits to do with them
- Give feedback on other writers' material and revise your own based on feedback from the room
- Assist with show logistics as necessary (ever wonder where the desk and couch go after every episode?)

All told, you can expect to put in between five and 10 hours per week in the two weeks leading up to a show. It's intense, but there's no greater feeling than the one you get once the show starts and that Buckcherry song starts playing. Being part of the show team takes a significant amount of time, though all of us do have major commitments outside of the show. *All-Nighter* should be one of your main activities, but it doesn't have to be your only one.
