

WILSON HOME TO VOTE.

President Greeted by Friends in
Princeton on Flying Trip.

PRINCETON, N. J., Sept. 28.—President Wilson paid a flying visit to Princeton today to register and vote in the Democratic primaries. The President's special car Superb arrived at 12:30 o'clock and left again for Washington at 1:55.

Accompanying the President were Dr. Grayson and Dr. Stockton Axson, the President's brother-in-law and a former member of the Princeton Faculty. Private Secretary Tumulty and Secretary of Congress Redfield accompanied the President as far as Princeton Junction, continuing on to their own homes to cast their votes.

A large number of friends, including townspeople, members of the Faculty, and students, gave the President a hearty greeting as he alighted from the train. He wore a broad smile as he consented to pose for student photographers and doffed his hat to a college yell. He went immediately to the polls, marked his ballot, and declined to discuss either suffrage or any other national question. The remainder of the time was spent in leisurely walking through the town and campus, nodding continually to friends.

A smile spread through the crowd when in answer to the question concerning occupation Mr. Wilson declared he was President of the United States, living in Washington.
