WILSON VOTES AT PRINCETON.

The President Then Puts In a Few Hours Making Visits.

PRINCETON, N. J., Sept. 23.—President Woodrow Wilson came home to vote in the Democratic primary to-day, and, after depositing his ballot for Gov. James F. Fielder for Governor, put in three hours visiting old acquaintances, sightseeing and shaking hands. Late in the afternoon he boarded his private car for the return trip to Washington, where he was due to arrive at 9:35 o'clock to-night.

The President stopped to visit his next-door neighbor, Mrs. Eliza Ricketts, 87 years old, a lifelong friend. Next he took Dr. Grayson to the gymnasium and proudly pointed out the red footballs that Princeton had won from Harvard, and the blue pigskins wrested from Yale. A trip to the power house was also made, and during the visit the President motored to the Cleveland Memorial Tower and Graduate College. He also visited the Lawrenceville School.

Just before the President went to his train he took a short stroll again through the campus near the station. John Grier Hibben, President of the university, happened along on horseback. He dismounted and shook hands with Mr. Wilson. The meeting was brief and formal. It was the first time many people had seen the two men together since the controversy arose over the
